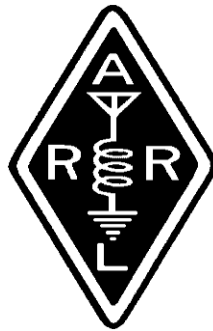

## FROM THE VICE PRESIDENT

Greetings to one and all, or maybe I should say, "Nihau." With the addition of two or three more words, I could expend my complete Chinese vocabulary. As I have spent very little time on things radio during the last month, I thought that I would pass on a few thoughts regarding my trip to China. The itinerary was Houston to San Francisco, SF to Beijing, Beijing to Xian, Xian to

Chengdu, Chengdu to Hong Kong, Hong Kong to Guilin, Guilin to Shanghai, Shanghai to Beijing, Beijing to San Francisco, SF to Houston and finally to Nacogdoches. I have taken trips with more than 10 flights, but I was much younger. I have to admit, this was a tough trip on old folks...

Anyway, I guess that the most astounding aspect of the trip was the Westernization of China. Not that I hadn't seen endless documentaries about the modernization of China, but it was ever so much more that I had expected. In almost any city that we visited, you could close your eyes and feel that you were in any large, crowded western city. The standing joke told to foreigners by the Chinese: "Do you know the Chinese national bird? No? It is the crane." And they then point up to the high-rise buildings going up in any direction to the cranes poised atop these structures hauling materials to the top. And it is true. Anywhere you

look, there is constant construction.

The people: I now know what it feels like to be a minority. The vast majority of the Chinese have never seen a white westerner. Although they try not to be rude about it, often someone will simply stop, open-mouthed to stare at the "foreign devil." And these are extremely polite people...if you catch them looking at you, they will quickly look away, but will try to look at you on the sly. And if you will acknowledge them, bob your head and smile, they light up and try to talk to you if they can. Very quickly, you become surrounded by a mob of people who want their picture taken with you. Often times there would be 20 or more people gathered round to get in the photo with cameras passing back and forth...quite fun. And I have never been in a country where people were kinder. If the wife and I were standing on a street, looking at a map, invariably someone would stop and

ask if they could help. Whenever we took a subway and were standing in some station looking at the route maps, someone would always stop and ask, "Do you need help?" Not only would they point out which route to take, but would lead us to the correct platform and stand there with us until the train came. One time, the person even got on the train with us and guided us to our stop. When I asked if this was his stop also, he stated that he was going in the opposite direction and just came to make sure we found the right stop! I can't help but wonder what that same good samaritan would encounter if he were to be lost in a subway in one of our big cities.

I could go on for hours about our experiences in China, but this is not supposed to be a travelogue.

As concerns things in the radio world, I spent a great Saturday morning at the Lufkin Hamfest. Army and I left Nac about 6:30

AM and made our way to the Hamfest. Things were already going well when we arrived. A good number of tables were filled with all manner of goodies, and we had a fine time browsing...over and over. A big hand to Jerry Wilson for all his hard work in organizing this fest. A great number of door prizes were given away as well as a grand prize of an ICOM 7200. Free breakfast provided by the Golden Corral...a group of VE's provided test facilities for those who were trying to become hams or upgrade. All in all, a very well presented Hamfest....kudos to all those whose good works made this possible.

I have had a great deal of luck lately on the HF bands...everything was open with the exception of 6 meters. Made a lot of good contacts and had a lot of fun doing it. What a great hobby we have....

Anyway, as I said, I haven't had much time to devote to radio this past month, so I'll cut this

short. Hope to see you all at the next NARC meeting in November.
