BASIC SIGNAL PROPAGATION PART 8

The February 2014 issue of QST has an excellent article on propagation that I suggest you read. The title of the article is *Solar Banners—A Propagation Resource* by Steve Andrea, AG1YK. It is on pages 78-79 of QST. It talks about solar parameters like the Solar Flux Index, Sunspot Numbers, X-ray Intensity, Interplanetary Magnetic Field, Solar Wind, Proton Flux, Electron Flux, Signal Noise Level, and Coronal Mass Ejection. It also deals with Geomagnetic Information. Don't let these terms discourage you. The URLs given below will help you interpret the terms that you find interesting.

There is also an interesting banner displayed on the URL www.QRZ.com . This QRZ banner provides a lot of interesting information about band conditions for the amateur operator.
