THE "BEST" TEXAS CHILI RECIPE W5NRF

Ingredients:

5 to 8 pounds beef Chuck, cut into 3/4 or 1" cubes (easy to cut if semi-frozen, do not remove fat)

2 tablespoons Worcestershire sauce

2 tablespoons olive, corn or peanut oil

8 to 10 crushed garlic cloves

2 large onions, chopped

fresh green jalapeno peppers, chopped (six or eight depending upon taste)

5 to 8 tablespoons fresh chili powder

46 ounce can tomato juice

1 tablespoon dry mustard powder

3 tablespoons apple cider vinegar

1/4 cup sugar

Preparation:

Put oil in large nonstick Dutch oven on stovetop. Dump in meat and stir with wooden spoon to coat meat. Sprinkle beef chunks with Worcestershire sauce. Turn heat on medium-high, stir meat a little to prevent sticking or burning. Water will come from meat and began boiling away. Continue high heat and turn occasionally until all water steams off. This may take 30 minutes.

Now lower heat slightly and brown meat without sticking or burning. Note: this step is very important. Add chopped onions and half of garlic, stir a minute or two, then add tomato juice to cover meat well, then add peppers and remaining garlic. Slow simmer an hour or so, covered. During this time a thin film of fat should cover most of the surface. If too much fat accumulates, carefully skim part of it and discard. Stir occasionally and add remaining juice or water any time if necessary to keep meat well-covered. Now add remaining ingredients, dissolving the mustard powder in a bit of water first. Stir well and slow simmer, covered, another two hours or more. Meat should be chewy, not falling apart, but not tough. Serve with pinto beans and extra jalapeno peppers on the side. Chili will taste even better the next day if any is left.

Super Monofilament Antenna

As we are into spring and April is here, it is time for a new antenna. This particular antenna will probably be the one you will want for your antenna farm to work lots of DX. The form of the antenna is a Delta Loop. We have discussed Delta Loop antennas before, however, this particular antenna is not only a Delta Loop but it is almost invisible because of its construction.

You will need to have a source of monofilament fishing line, probably at least 50 pound test line. First measure out a full wave-length at the desired operating frequency. You will also need enough cans of gold metal flake spray so you can coat the monofilament completely. After the spray has dried, you can form the monofilament into the Delta Loop. Since this is an equilateral triangle, I would suggest that you have one side horizontal and a vertex down (Fig. 1)

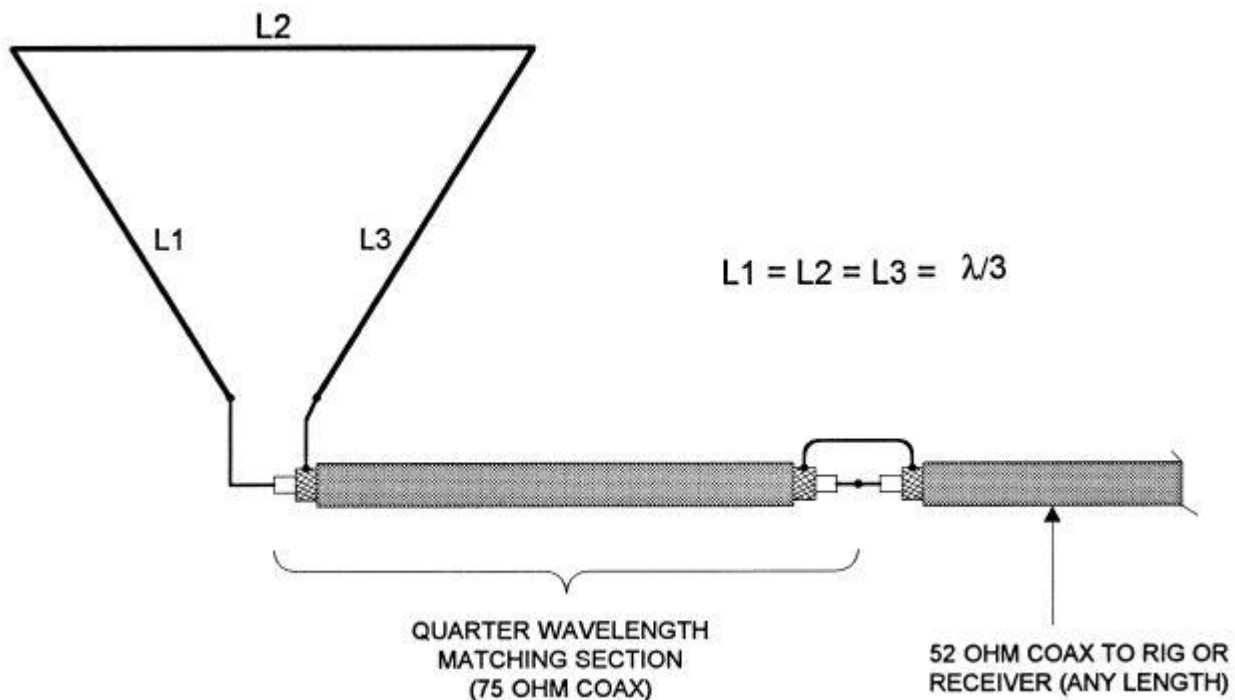

As you can see, you may want to use a quarter wavelength matching section to feed a 52 ohm rig. High test monofilament line must be used so you can pull the side L2 tight and maintain the shape of the antenna. The gold coating on the monofilament will provide a great velocity factor so the signals will slip off the antenna extremely well, increasing your effective radiated power! The gold glint of the antenna is also very attractive in your yard.

The 10 meter band has been very good these afternoons so I suggest this monofilament antenna for that band. The only downside I know about this antenna is that it only works on one day of the year and that is April 1. Let me know if it brings you any new DX.

******* ANTENNA RAISING INCIDENT *******

(EDITOR'S NOTE: This was found on a bulletin board in Fort Wayne, Ind. It is a ham's reply to a query from his insurance company.)

"I'm writing in response to your request for additional information for Block Number 3 of the Accident Reporting Form. I put "poor planning" as the cause for my accident. You said in your letter I should explain more fully, and I trust the following details will be sufficient."

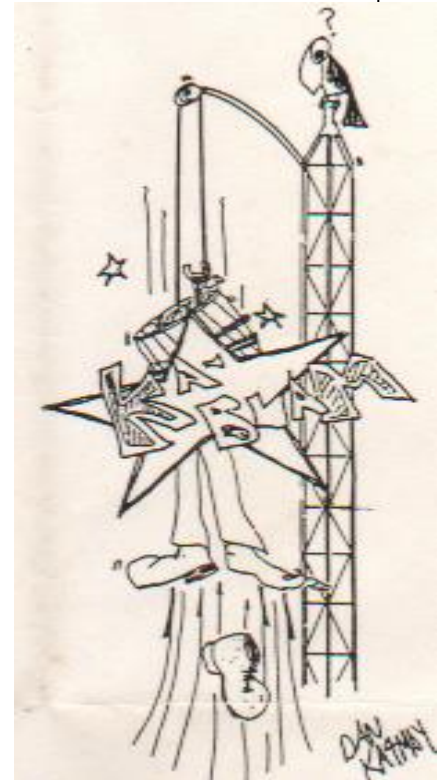
"I am an amateur radio operator and on the day of the accident, I was working alone on the top section of my new 80' tower. When I had completed my work I discovered that I had, over the course of several trips up the tower, brought up about 300 lbs. of tools and hardware. Rather than carry the now unneeded tools and materials down by hand, I decided to lower the items down in a small barrel by using a pulley, which fortunately was attached to the gin pole at the top of the tower.

"Securing the rope at ground level, I went to the top of the tower and loaded the tools and materials into the barrel. I went back to the ground and untied the rope, holding it tightly to insure a slow descent of the 300 lbs of tools. You will note in Block Number 11 of the Accident Reporting Form that I weigh only 155 lbs."

"Due to my surprise at being jerked off the ground so suddenly, I lost my presence of mind and forgot to let go of the rope. Needless to say, I proceeded at a rather rapid rate of speed up the side of the tower. In the vicinity of the 40' level, I met the barrel coming down; this explains my fractured skull and broken collarbone. Slowed only slightly, I continued my rapid ascent, not stopping until the fingers of my right hand were two knuckles deep into the pulley."

"Fortunately, by this time, I had regained my presence of mind and was able to hold on to the rope in spite of the pain. At approximately the same time, however, the barrel of tools hit the ground and the bottom fell out of the barrel. Devoid of the weight of the tools, the barrel now weighed approximately 20 lbs. I refer you again to my weight in Block Number 11. As you might imagine, I began a rapid descent down the side of the tower. In the vicinity of the 40' level, I met the barrel coming up; this accounts for the two fractured ankles and the lacerations on my legs and lower body."

"The encounter with the barrel slowed me enough to lessen my injuries when



I fell on to the pile of tools, and fortunately only 3 vertebrae were cracked. I'm sorry to report, however, that as I lay there on the tools, in pain, unable to stand, and watching the empty barrel 80' above me, I again lost my presence of mind. I let go of the rope."
