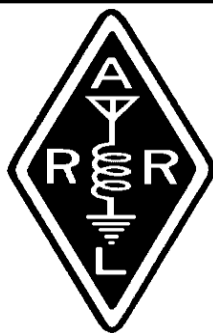

CONTESTING FOR NEW AND OLD

There has been a remarkable new development in the contesting world: a contest simulator that works in CW, SSB, RTTY, and PSK. If your contesting interest is CW, there has been an excellent simulator available for some time now with Morse Runner (<http://www.dxatlas.com/morserunner/>) and it's free to boot. If your CW skills are a little weak, Morse Runner is a great way to improve them.

Now comes a new contest simulator that can handle CW, SSB, RTTY and PSK modes. And it's free also, but you might want to buy

a copy of the logging program it works with.

Wayne Wright, W5XD, is the author of WriteLog, a contest logging program that is arguably the best RTTY logger available. Some years back, I used WriteLog for RTTY contesting and it worked very well.

Wayne, who lives in Round Rock, has continued to improve and update WriteLog, and now has a contest simulator that works with it. You can check it out at <https://writelog.com/> where you can download a free copy of his Contest Super Simulator (CSS) along with a free demo copy of WriteLog. To buy the full version of WriteLog is only \$30.

CSS has support for the ARRL Sweepstakes contest, the CW version of which comes up the weekend of November 5th, followed by the SSB version on November 19th.

So, if you want to try your hand at contesting which is

an excellent way to improve your operating skills, here is a way to practice BEFORE you get on the air. I'm not aware of any other way to do this on SSB and RTTY.

The usual disclaimers apply here.
