
Army AE5P gave a report on Field Day.

NOTES FROM OUR EC

Hot, hotter, hottest and Oh My Goodness! What a scorcher August, oops I mean July has been. Triple digit days, heat indices 110F plus (121 in Austin Monday the 23rd.) All of this heat reminds me of a science fiction movie THE CHRONICLES OF RIDDICK, specifically the prison planet of Crematoria, yep get out in the sun and you burn up quite literally. Of course it's not that bad but I'm sure you get the idea.

All this heat can easily lead to disastrous events, grass fires, forest fires, heat exhaustion or heat stroke in humans and in our pets. How well do you stay hydrated and keep your outdoor pets hydrated and cool. The symptoms and support are topics for another occasion, just remember, drink lots of water and if you get too hot, get inside and cool off.

There are a number of fires across the state.

Texas A&M has a link for active fires in the state. Our club was asked way back in September 2011 to provide comms support during the Angelina River Bottom Fire. The fire destroyed close to 10,000 acres between Nacogdoches and Cherokee counties, with \$890K lost in timber resources and over \$115K in direct cost to Nacogdoches County.

Some of our hams were able to provide support. All of that means, regardless of season, we can be called upon for support. And Hurricane Season, the 2018 edition, is still upon us

We still have a few more days left in July. I'm writing this on the 24th. I wanted to grab a few statistics and well you know down the rabbit hole I went again. I wanted to grab some numbers. Specifically, how many storms and or hurricanes July has.

The Hurricane Research Division of the Atlantic

Oceanographic and Meteorological Laboratory (NOAA) had some neat stuff. Now if my math is correct, historically we have about 7 tropical storms, 2 hurricanes and not quite 1 making land fall, you understand how statistics can be. I'll need to check it with Dr Tom. July did give us the 2 hurricanes this year Beryl (cat 1) and Chris (cat 2). The 48 hour outlook from the National Hurricane Center indicates no tropical cyclone activity expected within the next 48 hours.

One other thing I wanted to look at was the lovely (cough, cough) Saharan Dust that has been ruining our blue skies and making eyes itch. The dust is following the same trade wind path that hurricane low pressure systems follow coming out of Africa. So gee, I guess we can suffer from the dust or the storm cycle. Not much of a choice.

Don't forget to check into our Monday and Thursday nets, we meet at 8:00 pm

CT, 2000 hrs Local, or 0100 UTC, and for you military guys Mickey's big hand is straight up and his little hand is pointing at the 8.

ARDUINO PROJECT CONTEST

At the May 2018 meeting of NARC, the Arduino Project Contest was announced. The object of the contest is to promote interest, provide an educational opportunity, and give the members the chance to win some money.

Here are the rules:

Entry into the contest is limited to dues paying members of NARC, current in dues as of the May 2, 2018 meeting.

There are two entry categories. One is for members 50 years old and younger. The other is for members over 50 years old.

The object of the contest is to acquire the necessary hardware to build a project of the member's choice based on an Arduino micro-computer, and demonstrate his/her creation at the July 2018 NARC meeting. (**Changed to August NARC meeting**)

The member will also be required to program the Arduino as necessary using the appropriate language, and load the program into the Arduino as required.

The projects will be judged by the members present at the August NARC meeting. First prize in each category (<50, >50) will win \$250 cash. If there are at least 4 entries in a category, a second prize of \$100 will also awarded.

There are many sources of hardware currently available. One such source is this ad from Banggood for just \$21.99 with free shipping:

Members are not limited to using this particular kit, although it does appear to be an excellent starting point at a very reasonable price. Many books are available to show

how to assemble and program an Arduino to perform useful tasks. You have approximately 60 days to make this happen. Put on your thinking cap, order the material needed, and let's see what you can produce.

Remember, first prize is \$250 cash in each of the two categories.

Since these rules were originally sent out to all current members right after the May meeting, several things have popped up requiring some changes.

The first Wednesday in July is July 4th, which may well require the meeting date to be changed. Also, the July NARC meeting is normally our annual Ice Cream Social, and it probably would not be appropriate as a time to judge Arduino projects. When the rules were first prepared, it was expected that the shipping time to receive the Starter Learning Kit from Banggood would be about a week. It has turned out to take at least 3 weeks.

Given these things, I am changing the project completion date to the first Wednesday in August, when the projects will be judged by the members at our August meeting. Don't wait until mid-July to start this.
